



Academic English vs. General English

Academic English:

- Structured, formal, and objective
- Employs advanced vocabulary and complex syntax
- Used in scholarly writing and presentations
- Cites sources and evidences
 arguments
- Adheres to specific disciplinary conventions

General English:

- Informal, subjective, and varied in structure
- Includes everyday vocabulary and simpler sentence constructions
- Used in casual conversation and informal writing
- More personal and less concerned with formalities
- Flexible, adapting to social and cultural contexts





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

Clarification: Whenever you encounter complex passages or unfamiliar terminology, you can ask ChatGPT to rephrase the content or explain the terms in simpler language. This can help demystify jargon-laden texts and make dense academic material more approachable.

Discussion and Q&A Sessions:

Engage in Dialogue: Pose questions about the reading material to ChatGPT. Engaging in a back-and-forth dialogue can simulate a tutorial session where you can discuss themes, arguments, and implications of the study. This practice can sharpen your critical thinking and enhance your engagement with the text.

Quiz Creation: Use generative AI to create quizzes on the material you've read. This self-testing method is a proven study technique that can improve retention and understanding of academic content.

Diverse Exposure: Regularly listen to academic talks, debates, and discussions across different platforms such as TED Talks, academic podcasts, or university websites to get used to varied accents and terminology. **Listening with Text:** When available, use transcripts or subtitles while listening to lectures to improve comprehension and get familiar with the academic language used in different contexts.

How you could use Generative A.I. to improve your academic listening skills

Simulated Lecture Interaction:

Transcript-Based Listening Practice: Instead of listening to audio, use transcripts of lectures generated by ChatGPT as a reading exercise. Pretend these transcripts are spoken words and actively read them, simulating a listening exercise. This helps you practice academic listening skills by visualising how spoken content is structured.

Self-Generated Summaries: After 'listening' (or reading), write a summary of the key points and use ChatGPT to compare your summary against the original transcript. This method reinforces the material and tests your understanding and recall, similar to confirming comprehension in a listening exercise.

Imagined Dialogue and Discussion:

Simulated Q&A: Generate questions about the content of a 'lecture' (text) you've read and use ChatGPT to answer them. This simulates the experience of asking questions in a lecture and listening to responses, training your ability to form questions based on spoken content and to understand the responses.

Critical Thinking Enhancement: Engage in a text-based dialogue with ChatGPT on the topics of the 'lecture.' Argue a point or discuss implications to practice processing information as if it were obtained through listening.

Collaborative Feedback: Actively


seek out feedback from your peers. The constructive criticism you receive is essential for identifying your writing's strong points and potential improvements in style, organisation, and reasoning.
